Call meeting to order/Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Cahak called a meeting of the Lantana County Public Safety Committee to order on the above date at 8:00 a.m., the Pledge of Allegiance immediately followed.

Approval of Minutes of the November 05, 2013 meeting

Moved by Hardin, second by Dahms to approve the minutes of the November 05, 2013 meeting. All ayes. **Motion Carried.**

Coroner Report and paid bills

Larry Shadick presented the Coroner's report and paid bills. The Coroner's report was placed on file in the County Clerk's office with the minutes.

Moved by Dahms, second by Bonacci to approve the Coroner's report and paid bills as submitted. All ayes. **Motion Carried.**

Child Support Report and paid bills

for a month and Squad #7 the mileage was low due to it being in for repairs after a deer hit the front corner and caved in the side.

Sheriff/Jail Office/Medical Reports and paid bills

Sheriff Greening presented the Jail Office report and Medical report. The report was placed on file in the County Clerk's office with the minutes.

Sheriff Greening informed committee members that the Chevy Impalas are front wheel drive and not heavy duty enough to hold up well for the Sheriff's Office purposes. Sheriff Greening also stated that he's always gone with the V6 engines. Sheriff Greening informed committee members that he's had Dodge Chargers close to 8 years now and that the cages and brush guards are specific to makes and models and they can reuse them, otherwise it would be very costly to switch vehicles over with new equipment.

Moved by Bonacci, second by Dahms purchase the two (2) 2014 Dodge Charger's V6 and one (1) 2014 Dodge Durango V6 from Ewald Motors of Oconomowoc for a total of \$72,827. All ayes. **Motion Carried.**

Discuss use of Federal Forfeiture Funds

Sheriff Greening informed committee members that he has approximately \$140,000 in the Federal Forfeiture Fund. This money is from seized property or cash from drug arrests. Sheriff Greening stated that Gary Olsen told him that the auditors were concerned that if we didn't use this money that it would be taken away. Sheriff Greening checked with the Federal Agency that monitors the funds and there is no fear of the money being taken away if we don't spend it. Sheriff Greening wants this money used for outfitting the SRT team and a lot of other needs that will benefit the investigators that weren't budgeted for, but needed. This was for discussion only.

Approve write off of stale dated checks for the Jail Commissary account from 2011

Moved by Poltrock, second by Dahms to write off stale dated checks for the Jail Commissary account from 2011. All ayes. **Motion Carried.**

Discuss an Ordinance regulating the possession of exotic or wild animals

Pat Schmutzer expressed her concerns regarding a neighbor breeding Boa Constrictors and stated that she doesn't feel safe in her home anymore and that this is an accident waiting to happen if any of them get loose. Ms. Schmutzher stated that a couple of them are 8 to 10 feet long. Robin Stowe was present with sample ordinances regarding prohibited and protected animals. Ms. Schmutzer also provided a factsheet "Prohibit the Private Ownership of Dangerous Wild Animals". A copy of the factsheet is attached with the minutes. After lengthy discussion it was decided that with all the costs associated with this ordinance and not having the manpower to enforce one, this item was left for discussion at this time. Sheriff Greening stated that Ms. Schmutzer can call if any of the Boa Constrictors come on her property and the Sheriff's Office will respond.

Discuss an Ordinance prohibiting the use of a cell phone while driving

Chairman Cahak stated that he would like to see a statewide law prohibiting the use of a cell phone while driving. Robin Stowe stated that hands free would not apply and that there are other exceptions. Stowe stated that it's up to the state to adopt prohibiting the use of a cell phone while driving and questioned whether the county has the authority to make up it's own. There are state statutes that would cover this

under inattentive driving if law enforcement feels the driver is not paying attention to their driving while on their cell phone. Moved by Dahms, second by Bonacci to table this item. All ayes. **Motion Carried.**




Emergency Management Report-December 2013

November ushers in the beginning of the winter season. Winter Awareness week was Nov. 4-8. I produced a local winter awareness brochure and distributed it to several outlets. Several communications issues still linger. Plans are in place for having a State Exercise Officer come to Langlade County and meet with the planning committee to put an exercise schedule/topic cycle together. Below is a brief synopsis of some of the month's activities:

- Met with Dept. of Transportation, Town of Ackley officials, Hwy. Dept. and law enforcement on the proposed Hwy 64 project from the Lincoln Co. line to Zima Rd. scheduled for the summer of 2014.
- Attended IPAWS (Integrated Public Alert Warning System) training on local participation sending out alerts.
- Attend Northeast Region EM meeting on 2014 Plan of Work requirements and regional issues.
- Worked with North Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, Oneida Co. and Langlade Co. IT personnel to maintain the damage assessment application that is hosted on Langlade's network.
- Conducted the monthly 14 county WISCOM roll call.
- Met with Health Dept., Head Start, Red Cross, and elder population groups to address activities to work with those vulnerable populations.
- Attend Traffic Safety Commission. Funds will be distributed from EM budget for promotional materials.
- Gave a presentation to the Hyland Lakes Lions Club in Bryant on the Emergency Management Dept.



Prohibit the Private Ownership of Dangerous Wild Animals


Wisconsin is one of only six states that have little to no laws

Dangerous wild animals are readily available to unqualified people.

Laws prohibiting the private ownership of dangerous wild animals—such as big cats, bears, primates, wolves, alligators, and crocodiles—promote animal welfare and protect human safety. These animals can cause death, inflict serious injury, and spread deadly diseases. It is difficult, if not impossible, for individuals to meet the animals' specialized needs in captivity.

Wisconsin laws must be changed to prohibit future ownership of dangerous wild animals. Lax laws in Wisconsin make it one of the weakest in the country, threatening the safety of its residents, and would hardly keep tragic incidents—such as the one in Zanesville, Ohio, where a disturbed man released nearly 50 big cats, bears, primates, and wolves before committing suicide—from occurring here. Wisconsin currently has no ban on the private possession of most dangerous exotic animals, which results in situations such as the seizure of a 3-year-old baboon who was living in a Madison basement laundry room and the Baraboo girl who was bitten by a lion cub being exhibited at a pet store.

Threat to animal welfare. Most individuals cannot provide appropriate and humane care for captive wild animals. Experts including the Association of Zoos and Aquariums and the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians oppose the private possession of exotic and dangerous wild animals as pets.

Threat to public health and safety. More than 40 people have been killed by captive big cats, bears, primates, and dangerous reptiles in the United States since 1990, and many more have been injured. These animals retain their basic instincts, even if they are captive born and hand raised. Emergency personnel should not have to confront a rampaging chimpanzee or a stalking tiger. Wild animals can carry diseases such as rabies, tuberculosis, Herpes B virus, and Salmonella.

Burden to taxpayers and law enforcement: Taxpayers routinely foot the bill for costs related to escapes, attacks, and confiscations caused by irresponsible pet owners. Police, animal control, and other emergency personnel funded by tax dollars must respond to incidents involving these very deadly predators.

No impact on zoos, sanctuaries, circuses, or most current owners. Legislation would exempt zoos accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, sanctuaries accredited by the Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries, research and educational facilities, and circuses. Existing animals should be grandfathered so that people who currently have these animals can keep them, but breeding and new acquisitions of restricted species should be prohibited.

Many states prohibit private possession of wild animals as pets. Since 2004, states including Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Oregon, and Washington have enacted legislation prohibiting certain wild animals as pets, joining states that already had such rules. With exotic and native wildlife readily available from dealers and over the Internet, states that do not act will attract a growing problem.
